On a daily basis, I work with and advise students on career options in journalism, visual journalism and multimedia. The field of visual journalism continues to evolve and offer new opportunities for our students. Having spent 25 plus years in the profession, I have a unique perspective and am well equipped to discuss options and advise students. Editors often contact me for names of students to preform freelance photojournalism or multimedia work in our community. My own career began overseas and students often approach me for advice on international career options. My involvement with the international study abroad program provides students hands on international experience and me the opportunity to mentor students in visual journalism techniques in a real-world environment. In addition, I write on average seven to ten reference letters per semester.

Development and Scholarly Activity Supporting Teaching; Use of Technology, etc.

<u>Professional Development Leave – Fall 2017 Semester</u>

On professional development leave during the fall 2017 semester to pursue a photojournalism and multimedia documentary project on "The Changing Face of Britain." as viewed through the photorealistic documentary painting style of British landscape painter Algernon Newton (1880-1968). During the 1920s and 30s Algernon Newton began painting the poorer districts, slums and less appreciated urban scenes surrounding London's Surry and Regents cannels. Areas once busy during the second industrial revolution of the 19ths century and now, in the 1920s and 30s, left dark and neglected by the changing demographics of the city. In the 1940s until his death in 1968, Algernon continued to paint the changing cityscape of London, but also the English countryside from Yorkshire to Cornwall.

Advanced Multimedia Course Development and Launch

During the spring of 2014 I began curriculum development on JOUR 480/580 – Advanced Multimedia. The course launched as journalism elective for the spring 2015 semester. The course builds on the beginning photojournalism course, JOUR 203 and the Principles of Multimedia course, JOUR 307 and focuses on advanced storytelling and multimedia techniques with an emphasis on documentary style filmmaking.

The course is a hands-on advanced multimedia course that provides students with the opportunity to refine their multimedia story telling and technical production skills by producing two journalistically interesting multimedia projects, one a subject profile the other an issue news short documentary. The multimedia projects will be well researched and include some combination of text, video, audio, still photographs, graphics that will be presented on a Web site. Through interactive exercises and assignments emphasis will be given to improving audio, video, still image capture and editing skills. The course introduces Apple Motion as a tool for creating motion maps and graphics.

Principles of Multimedia Course Development

Since joining the School of Journalism in the fall of 2007 I have been leading the effort to rebuild the photojournalism program by redesigning and implementing curriculum changes to the core photojournalism classes. These changes include, the introduction of multimedia and visual storytelling into the photojournalism and writing curriculum and involved the design of presentations and assignments. These changes were necessary before implementing the next phase of multimedia and visual storytelling throughout the journalism curriculum, and the design and implementation of a new course focusing on multimedia storytelling. During the 2008 academic year, I set out to create this new class. During this period I worked with Professors Susan Knight and Shahira Fahmy, to design the syllabi for JOUR307-Principles of Multimedia and JOUR 507 – Reporting with Multimedia. The courses began as pilot sequences during the Fall 2009 semester and are currently required for all Journalism School students.

The Principles of Multimedia course includes instruction in multimedia and visual storytelling incorporating stills, audio, video, text, mapping and graphic elements. Current trends in visual storytelling, writing for the Web, online journalism and ethics are covered. Guest lectures by journalism professors and professionals in the field round out the course.

Reporting With Multimedia Course Development

In the fall of 2011 I took over teaching of the equivalent graduate multimedia course, JOUR 507 – Reporting with Multimedia. The course required a complete redesign. Changes and course development included enhancing basic foundations of visual storytelling including an introduction to visual concepts used in still and motion imagery collection. The inclusion of sound, video, multimedia software and the importance of storytelling to all aspects of visual communication in both traditional and social media outlets completed the redesign. As with the undergraduate program, incorporating multimedia throughout the graduate curriculum is an ongoing process. The course now provides the foundations for student's in the graduate program to enhance their reporting with visual productions throughout their course work in the school.

<u>Afghanistan Journalism Education Enhancement Program - Photojournalism course development and overseas photojournalism and multimedia training</u>

In the fall of 2011 the School of Journalism was awarded an Afghan Enhancement Education Enhancement grant for one million dollars to assist Nangarhar University in Jalalabad, Afghanistan to develop a professional journalism program. I was invited by the grant director Professor Maggy Zanger to develop the photojournalism and multimedia curriculum for the project. During the Spring 2012 semester I designed a curriculum that included a syllabus, seven assignments, rubrics and 14 visual PowerPoint presentations. The challenge was to design a program where modern visual journalism technology was limited or nonexistent. Through contacts at my former employer, Knight Ridder/Tribune, I was given permission and provided access to their extensive global photography database that included thousands of images from Afghanistan. These images provided the foundation for the visual presentations. By having access to local Afghan images, the

visual lecture presentations would provide Afghan university students with local visual context for assignments and lectures.

During the summer of 2013 I participated in the Summer Journalism Skills Academy in Hyderabad, India. Journalism faculty from three U.S. universities attended the training workshops along with the journalism faculty from our partner Afghan universities. The University of Arizona School of Journalism participated as part of its work with Nangarhar University in Jalalabad, Afghanistan. The summer training focused on building student-produced media and emphasized teacher mentoring, multimedia production and fieldwork. The program was held from June 24, 2013 – July 8, 2013

During the winter of 2013/2014 I participated in the Afghan Journalism Education Enhancement Program in New Delhi, India. The Afghan Journalism Education Enhancement seminar was a collaboration between the UA School of Journalism, University of Nebraska Omaha Collage of Communication, Nangarhar University, Jalalabad, Afghanistan and Kabul University. The program emphasized journalism, photojournalism and multimedia pedagogy, as well as the practical implementation of the Nangarhar University photojournalism curriculum. The program was held from Dec. 29, 2013 – Jan. 11, 2014.

During the summer of 2014 I participated in the Afghan Education Enhancement skills training program in Istanbul, Turkey. The summer's collaboration included Nangahar University, Balkh University, Heart University, Khost University, San Jose State and Ball State University and focused on teaching techniques, course and syllabus development, writing for the Web, radio and television production and advanced multimedia storytelling development and production. The teaching academy was held from Aug. 1, 2014 – Aug. 14, 2014.

During the fall semester 2014 two of our Afghan colleges from Nangarhar University, Professors Afsar Sadiq Shinwari and Jamil Popalzy came to the University of Arizona School of Journalism for intensive training in photojournalism and multimedia pedagogy, hardware and software instruction, continued instruction in course development and intensive language training. I received a course release to work with the Afghan professors.

One Day at the U of A Project

Since the Spring 2008 semester I worked with Journalism 205-Reporting the News students and instructors to produce the One Day at the U of A publication project, a joint project between the School of Journalism and Dean of Students office. The annual project results in a 16-page photographic record of one day in the visual life of the university and is published as an insert in the Arizona Daily Wildcat.

In the Spring 2009 semester I oversaw the transfer of this project from the JOUR205 curriculum to the photojournalism curriculum. To do so, I designed and implemented a 24-hour photographic assignment for both JOUR203-Photojournalism and JOUR497B-Advanced Photojournalism students to produce the required visual content. In addition, I arranged collaborations with the journalism editing classes taught by Professor Bruce Itule and the design class headed by Professor Gawain Douglas. This collaboration allowed students to participate in the project by using their skills to fact check, write captions and produce the layout and design of the final publication. The resulting project has been well received by the campus community, Dean of Students office and Marshall Foundation who help fund the work.

Use of Technology

Everything I do in the visual journalism/multimedia curriculum involves and incorporates the use of technology and the use of technological innovations and advances. Since arriving at the School of Journalism I have dramatically increased the use of technology in the redesign and development of the photojournalism and

multimedia course curriculums. This has included introducing multimedia and multimedia production to the JOUR 203 – Photojournalism curriculum, the introduction, development and design of the JOUR 307, JOUR 507 and JOUR 480/580 multimedia classes.

As chair of the technology committee, I have worked with the director and faculty to upgrade the school's technological infrastructure including computer hardware, software and the introduction of video cameras. The incorporation of these tools is not limited to the photojournalism/multimedia curriculum, but is part of a larger convergence throughout the journalism curriculum.

I work regularly with campus IT software instructors to provide boot camp software workshops for students. Beginning in the fall of 2009 I worked with OSCR to provide Final Cut Pro editing software training to JOUR 203-Photojournalism and JOUR 497B – Advanced Photojournalism classes. In 2011 and 2012 I worked with Fine Art's Technology Systems Administrator Dane Velasquez who provided a series of workshops on the new Final Cut X software to all interested faculty and the three sections JOUR 307 – Principles of Multimedia classes. The software will be incorporated into the curriculum beginning with the fall 2012 semester.

Starting with the fall 2016 semester the Adobe Creative Cloud suite will be used throughout the visual journalism curriculum.
